




Asylum seekers in Sweden

Most of them financed from the Swedish Rural Development Program 2007-2013






Grön framtid - Green Future

Two year course in entrepreneurship and vocational training 2009 – 2011. Theory was mixed with practice

Organized by Farmers Union, a "Folk High School" and a garden/agricultural school

23 participants from different countries

9 persons had a job after finishing the course, two started their own companies.







Öppna Gränser - Open borders

Project together with the National Land Survey,

Forestry Board, Borlänge municipality and an employment agency

900 km borders between properties needed forest clearing.

31 people including 22 with a Somali background, were trained and employed for the operation

Most of the Somali participants have moved on to new positions after the project.







Eco trails

Long-term unemployed Swedish born were together with foreign-born in the same project.

They were placed as additional labor in active Leader projects.

Of a total of 14 participants received 11 jobs after the project ends, the eight foreign-born had seven jobs

or started their own businesses.

- Follow-up to previous projects what has happened to those involved?
- Identify structural and bureaucratic barriers
- Finding ways for immigrants to work in land-based industries

- Finding ways to help immigrants who start new businesses in rural areas





Thematic working group action plan 2015 – 2016

Model for inventory of housing in rural areas

- Pilot projects in three counties, with in each three municipalities
- Inventory for housing ("fine combing") and other accommodation in rural areas.
- The pilot could lead to a model that in addition to housing also considers opportunities for work, good infrastructure, schools, service, etc.





Questions

- How can the integration in a small community be managed (like in a village)?
- What is the role of rural civil organisations?
- How can the confidence between the local people and immigrants, even refugees be increased?
- How can the local society be opened?
- How can the confidence of immigrants be increased, since their only one social capital is the confidence?
- What are the most effective <u>methods</u> for social inclusion of refugees and immigrants <u>in rural areas?</u>
- What possibilities are there for **funding** projects on social inclusion (for example CLLD, EAFRD, ESF etc.)?
