Asylum Seekers (April 2015)


- 3,106 asylum seekers receive accommodation and financial support in Glasgow
- 12.5% of all asylum seekers in the UK
- 0.5% of Glasgow's overall population

Refugees (April 2015)

- Between 500 800 claims granted pa
- Around 2/3 of refugees stay in Glasgow 3 years after refugee status
- Estimated 20-25,000 in Scotland
- No-one exactly knows how many in Glasgow!?!




- Lack of planning

2001 – 41,854 (7.2% population)







Comparing populations



Legislative Context



- A raft of legislation (and policy) since 1970s
- Increasing in frequency since mid 90s
- Successively limiting rights to rights and entitlements
- 1999 NASS: dispersal and section 4
- 2002 section 55: requirement to claim asylum as soon as reasonably practicable
- 2004 section 9: withdrawal of support to families
- 2005 5 Year Strategy
- 2008/09 *Simplification Bill...*
- 2013 Immigration Act
- 2014 Independence Referendum....



- Refugees and asylum seekers are able to achieve the English
 Language skills they need to successfully integrate with
 Scotland's communities
- Refugees and asylum seekers access appropriate education opportunities and increase their qualifications/knowledge/ experience as a result
 - 3. Refugees and asylum seekers are supported to use preexisting qualifications and access appropriate employment/ additional education opportunities as a result
- 4. Scotland's linguistic diversity is promoted and as a result is valued, enabling refugees to contribute fully/effectively to Scottish society
